Accommodation

Banking

It is highly recommended that you check with your current bank in your home country to see if they have branches or affiliated banks here in the UK.

You may be able to use the same bank account and arrange a ATM card from your home country. If your bank has an affiliated bank in the UK, then you will be able to setup an account from home. You may be required to transfer a sum of money in GBP into your new bank account. You may be charged a small setup fee.

Alternatively, you can apply to open an account with a global bank such as HSBC whom have a global network of branches. The most cost effective way of setting up an account here in the UK is to do so when you arrive.

Please remember when setting up a UK bank account you will be required to provide proof of identity (passport) and address, which normally consists of bringing a utility bill showing your home address. You may also be required to produce previous bank statements and a reference letter from your home bank.

Emergency Services

If you require the emergency services whilst in the UK, you will need to dial **999** from your mobile of landline.

The operator will then give you the option of speaking to the police, the fire brigade or ambulance service, and will then connect you directly to the emergency service you require.

<u>NHS Direct</u> is a medical helpline for non-life threatening medical emergencies. Dial **111** for this service.

For non-emergency assistance from the police, you should call **101**. This is for crimes that are not an emergency but require immediate police attention. For example, if your car is stolen.

Getting Around

Common travel links in the UK are trains, buses & tubes in central London.

The UK has a developed and reliable means of transport depending on where you decide to work. Many overseas teachers do not purchase a car in this country so it is important that you understand the UK travel network & that you will be able to commute to your place of work and places of interest with ease.

Teachers seeking work in rural areas may find a car delivers more flexibility and freedom due to more limited transport links.

Living in Kent

Mobile Phone

We highly recommend that you unlock your mobile phone in your country of origin prior to your arrival. You will then be able to install a UK sim card and use your phone immediately.

If your mobile phone has not been unlocked your existing mobile phone provider will be able to provide this service for you.

Here in the UK you have a choice between contract & Pay-As-You-Go options. The best value for money is quite often Sim-Only plans. These are generally available on monthly contracts and come with packages for minutes, texts and data.

You may be required to obtain a NI number whilst working in the UK. How you pay depends on whether you're employed or self-employed.

Term Dates

All schools in the UK are separated by 3 terms in each academic year:

- Autumn Term (September December)
- Spring Term (December April)
- Summer Term (April July).

Every term is divided into 2, with a 1 week break in the middle, which is known as Half Term.

Christmas holidays are normally 2 weeks long and run from a few days before Christmas, into the new year normally between the 2nd and the 5th of January.

Easter holidays normally run for 2 weeks and like most countries we have several bank holidays throughout the year.

Umbrella Companies

Most international teachers work via an umbrella company. Working through an umbrella company means that you become their employee and they will be responsible for your pay and tax contributions. Rikama Education will pay the umbrella company weekly and in turn they will pay you, after deducting your tax and NI if applicable.

They will pay you a net salary into your personal bank account, also on a weekly basis.

Utilities
